- n There are rules relating to raffles and lotteries and also legal requirements regarding prizes. Check with your local authority.

There are many ways in which you can get together for a good cause.

A is for.....

Abseil – Raise sponsorship to abseil down a local or well known venue or landmark. **Auction of Promises** – sell a promise like washing a car, walking a dog or the services of your IT manager at work!

Australia Day – Hold a barbeque with an Australian quiz

Activity Day – Arrange an activity and invite your friends along.

B is for.....

Basket "athon" – 24 hour sponsored basket ball 's in the hoop.

Balloon Pop – Place winning and losing messages for your lucky dip in a balloon and sell a pop!

Barbecue – at the beach or in the back garden, a great way to get together.

Book sale – bring your previously read books in to work and sell to your friends.

Bean Growing Competition – organise a competition to see who can grow the biggest bean stalk.

Beard Shave –, shave it off and raise money for charity. **Bingo** – they're easy to arrange and easy to play!

Bowling Night – add extra things like a raffle, a buffet and a DJ.

Bake a cake – bake some cakes and sell to your friends!

Bush Tucker Trial – sponsor people to eat strange and bizarre food!

C is for.....

Car Park Space Raffle - raffle to win the car parking space closest to your work for a month.

Car Washing – Organise a car wash and sell snacks whilst people wait.

Circus Skills – invite an expert to come in and help teach people some circus skills, things like how to ride a unicycle and juggling etc.

Coffee Morning – get your team together for a tea break, try to come up with some ideas for fundraising like selling cakes or holding a small quiz.

Coin Collection – ask people to bring their unused or old foreign coins..

Computer Game Tournament – something like football, Olympics or tennis. Hire a big screen to play it on. You could even try and organise it around key sports events!

Cookery Book – get everyone to share their favourite recipes

D is for.....

Darts Games – you can play all sorts of games with a dart board and a set of darts. **Doughnut Day** – buy plenty of doughnuts and get people to try and eat as many as possible in a certain time.

Dragons Den – like the show teams must pitch ideas to get £50 and make that £50 into as much money as possible. The winners are the ones who make the most.

E is for.....

Egg Hunt – great for Easter, find them, design them, have a game to see who can hide their's the best and be the last to be found.

Exercise Bike Race – hold during the winter months in your canteen, get sponsored for how far they can go. Find a route and mark their progress on the map.

F is for.....

Fancy dress – a party, a dare to wear anything can be done with fancy dress. **Fireworks Display** – organise one and sell tickets.

Five-a-side Football Tournament – challenge different teams to a match and pay to enter.

G is for.....

Give up a Vice Month – give up something like smoking, or biting your nails .

Go-karting – get those who think they drive the best, and challenge them to justify their driving skills.

Golf Day – hold a golf day, or a session on a driving range.

Guessing Competition - how many sweets in a jar or who is that baby.

H is for.....

Halloween – hold a lantern competition. Sell the pumpkins to make the lanterns then once they've been sculptured organise a display and have people vote for their favourite. **Hatters Tea Party** – hold a tea part of just a day of wearing silly hats in your office. Charge those that do wear a hat a bit and those that don't a lot.

Haunted House – organise a sleep over in a haunted house or hotel and get sponsored for your trouble.

I is for.....

Ice-skating - organise a trip to you local ice rink and incorporate some other fund raising ideas like who can do a lap of the rink in the fastest time.

It's a Knockout –organise it yourself by coming up with some games involving lots of water, and silly games or you can bring the professionals in to arrange a larger event.

J is for.....

Jail Break – Lock up your chief executive or director in a room and give them only their mobile phone and a calculator. They then have to ring round all their contacts and raise as much money as they can before you free them.

Jam Making – make your own jam and sell it to your friends and neighbours.

Jazz Night –organise a trip to a local jazz club or a local pub and arrange a jazz evening.

K is for.....

Karaoke Night – add it on to another event like a meal or leaving party. People can vote for their favourite singer by giving money. The one who raises the most wins.

L is for.....

Lawn Mowing Service – advertise and sell your lawn skills for a price .

Line Dancing Night – have a barn dance. make the moves up or ask a professional charge to join in and give a prize for the best dancer.

Lunchtime Learning – invite someone to give a lunchtime lecture or demonstration, like a chef.

M is for.....

Market Stall – invite someone with a market stall to set up at your canteen and arrange

for them to either make a donation to charity or to donate a cut of their profits or hold a Tack sale and charge for tables.

N is for.....

National Days/Weeks/Months – celebrate a National day. For example you can do St. Patrick's Day, 4th July to wackier ones like National Potato Day.

Netball – you could organise a match directors versus charity team

Noisy Contest – the opposite of a sponsored silence

O is for.....

Odd Job Day – spend a day or a lunchtime asking if anyone has any odd jobs they need doing for a charitable contribution.

Orienteering Day – hold your own orienteering day either around the grounds of your office , school or your local woods.

P is for.....

Pantomime –organise a coach and invite staff and their families to a trip to a local pantomime.

Penalty Fines –if someone turns up late for a meeting, if someone forgets to turn off their mobile or if they're fiddling with their Blackberry while someone is talking – fine them.

Plant Sale –great idea during spring and the beginning of summer. Hand out forms, taking orders and collecting money, then order the plants in bulk at a discount rate and once they are delivered people come and collect their order.

Pool Competition –hire a pool table for your canteen and let people practice for a week before holding a tournament.

Q is for.....

Quiet Time – a sponsored silence, especially good if you work in a noisy office.

Quiz – this is a great way to bring people together.

R is for.....

Real Man Competition – 2 weeks for contestants to grow the best moustache and sideburns they can and charge an entry fee.

Record Breaking Attempt – think you can beat eating 3 crackers in under 34.78 seconds or spinning a coin for longer than 19.37 seconds. Try your own record breaking competition.

Recycle – any old clothes recycle them through RRC recycling appeal.

Ride – Sponsored horse ride with a group or on your own or ask a riding stable in your area to do one for you on our behalf.

S is for.....

Shrapnel Bucket – encourage people to give up their 1p and 2p pieces for charity. **Stocks** – put your boss in the stocks and charge people for the opportunity to throw water sponges.

Sponsored sky dive – jump out of an aeroplane to raise money.

T is for.....

Table Football Tournament – pay to enter and see who the champion is..

Talent Contest or Silly Talent Contest – for example playing a bicycle pump on your cheek.

Tartan Party – celebrate Burns Night (January 25th) by dressing in tartan, eating Haggis.

Tea Dance – why not organise one for elderly people who live locally. **Treasure Hunt** – organise one around your village or work.

Tug-of-war – challenge another team to this – the losers make a donation.

U is for.....

University Challenge – find the most highly educated people in your office and challenge them.

Unwanted Gift Sale – great idea for the New Year.

V is for.....

Valentine's Event – take orders in advance and buy your roses directly from Holland. You'll make loads of money and the quality will be so much better.

Variety Show – probe you colleagues to discover their hidden talents and then showcase them in a talent show.

Vegetarian Evening – prove to the meat eating world that being a veggie is best.

Videoathon – share your love of musicals, Star Wars by holding an evening of them

W is for.....

Walkathon – but instead of walking somewhere have everyone who wants to participate wear a step counter.

Wine Tasting Evening – invite an expert in to discuss and teach the finer points of wine tasting.

X is for.....

Xenodochionology (love of hotels) – organise a hotel hunt in your local area where the aim is for teams to collect as many hotel brochures in a certain amount of time.

Xenodochial (kindness to strangers) – have a competition to see how kind you can be to strangers.

Xenophilia (love of foreigners) – celebrate your love of foreigners by organising an International day where people could dress up in the national dress of different countries, eat international cuisine and enter a geography quiz.

Y is for.....

Yellow Theme Night – everything is yellow from the Coldplay song playing when they arrive to the food they eat like Bananas, yellow peppers, lemons..

Yellow Moon – Hand out yellow moon brochures at your school or playgroup for Racehorse Rescue Centre.

Yodelling Competition – have various prizes for the loudest, the most convincing and most frightening.

Yoga-thon – get a group of yoga fans together and see who can last the longest. You could give the prize of a professional massage for the winner.

Z is for.....

Zip Slide – easy to organise and if you talk to your local Army/RAF base .

Zodiac Reading – invite a fortune teller into your home and get them to read people's fortunes.

Zoo Trip – organise a family day out to a zoo.
